**Special to Business Women's Convention is Proposed.**  
A delightful vacation trip is in prospect for southern members of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs in connection with the July convention, to be held on Mackinac Island, Mich., a well-known summer resort, according to an announcement from Mrs. Florence Stone, New Orleans, former national treasurer. Mrs. Stone was visited during the week by Miss Earline White, Mississippi state president, who is proposing a Dixie special train to take southern and Mississippi valley delegates to Chi-

cago, where a boat would be chartered to the island. Miss White has written state organizations, and is communicating with railroad officials on rates and other possibilities in connection with the plan. Because local interest was so thoroughly aroused in the holding of the 1928 convention here, a large delegation is expected to represent Louisiana and Mississippi at the 1929 meeting.

### 16. FAILING TO ENCOURAGE OPPONENTS TO HOLD UP MASTER CARDS

North (Dummy)—  
♠ 6 4 3  
♥ 8 7 5  
♦ 7 5 4  
♣ 5 4 3 2

West—  
Leads ♠ 3 East—

South (Declarer)—  
♠ Q J 10 8 5  
♥ A 6 4  
♦ A K J  
♣ A K

The Bidding—South bids one spade, all pass.

Deciding the Play—West leads 3 of diamonds and Declarer takes with Jack of diamonds. What card should Declarer play?

The Error—Declarer determines to draw trumps and plays Queen of spades.

The Correct Method—Declarer observes that he has two losers in hearts and two in spades. To frame an effort must be made to lose only one trick in spades.

West may hold King X X and East Ace X or vice versa. If the 10 of spades is played on the first round, West will be tempted not to cover it, figuring that East will cover. South should play 10 of spades and in all probability neither West nor East will take this trick.

The Principle—The effort to frame should always be made even though the outlook seems hopeless.

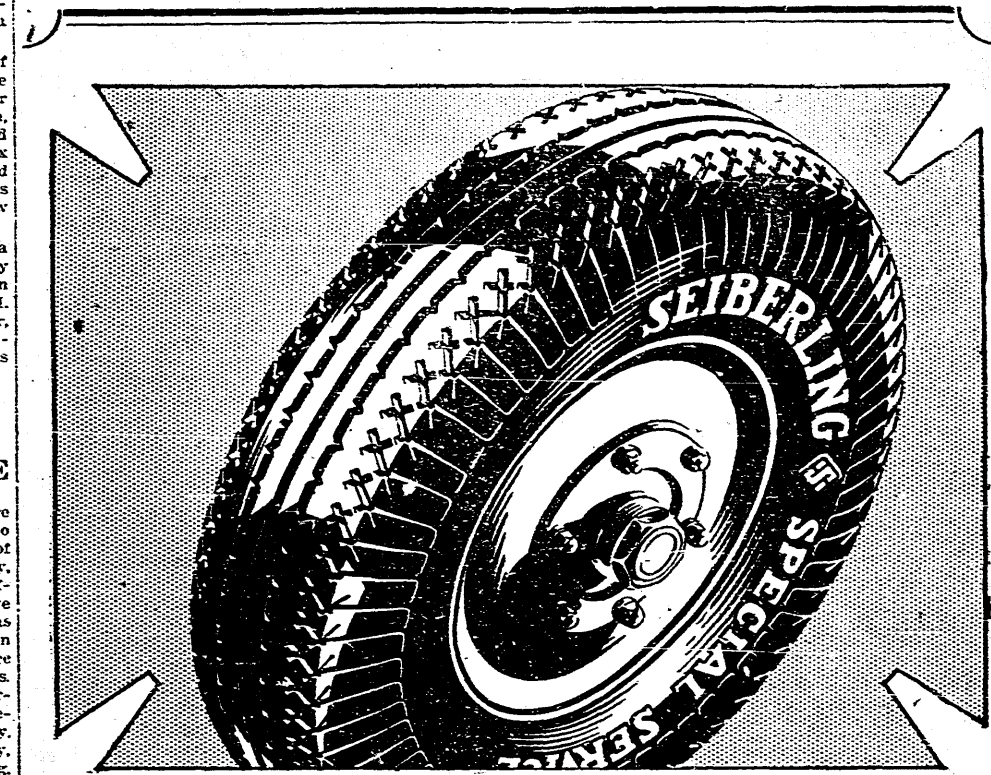

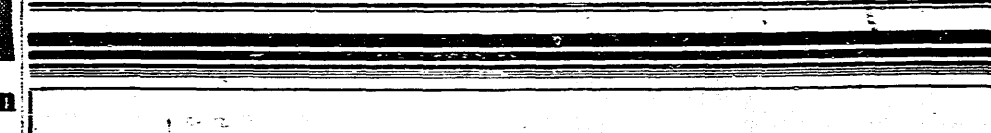
